MPW has been helping students get into Oxford and Cambridge since 1973. In fact, our college was founded with the explicit aim of doing just that.

Since then, we have grown into one of London's leading independent sixth-form colleges. Now we prepare over 600 students aged 14-19 for exam success in a broad range of subjects at GCSE and A level and our relaxed, collegiate atmosphere and small class sizes provide excellent preparation for life at university. Every year we prepare between twenty and thirty students for application to Oxford and Cambridge. Over the past 20 years we have helped close to 700 applicants, many of whom have been successful in winning a place.

Making the cut

First of all, let's be honest. No matter how much preparation a student is given, he or she has to be an excellent candidate to stand a chance of being offered a place at Oxford or Cambridge. Competition for places is intense for all subjects. Statistics showing the number of applicants, the number of offers made and places gained are available on both universities' websites. Across the board, a candidate has a roughly 1 in 5 chance of obtaining a place.

The minimum requirement is AAA at A level but it is much more likely that you will be asked for A*AA or A*A*A, the higher offer becoming increasingly typical for science courses and medicine. Whilst the universities can be sympathetic to extenuating circumstances, achievement of these grades is effectively non-negotiable. You should note that there is no advantage to studying four A levels and doing so may well result in a four-grade offer.

Neither Cambridge nor Oxford require specific GCSEs but they do say that most applicants have a high proportion of A and A* grades. With the recent changes to A levels, many students will no longer be sitting modular A levels and will therefore not be able to submit AS grades and unit scores as part of their application. Both universities are clear that this will not put any student at a disadvantage.

Oxford and Cambridge also set admissions tests for the majority of their courses. Depending on your course and university, these are assessments that you may sit before interview or if you go up for interview. They do not require you to learn anything beyond the specification of the relevant A level(s) but rather are designed to test to your capacity to think and apply your knowledge.

There is no one factor that determines whether you will be offered a place. Predicted or actual grades at A level or equivalent, performance in admissions tests, school references, the personal statement and performance at interview are all reviewed carefully before a candidate is offered a place or rejected.

The interview

There's no real mystery about what you are likely to be asked at the interview. The questions are intended to engage you in an academic discussion that enables the college to find out about your intellectual abilities, whether they will enjoy teaching you and, last but not least, your potential for future development. Students who are likely to do well at interview are those who have read well beyond the demands of their A level courses and can demonstrate both depth and breadth of learning in their subject(s) of choice.

At interview, you need to prove that you can:

- · listen effectively;
- absorb facts and ideas presented to you and assess their relevance;
- · respond to problems and criticisms; and
- · present arguments in a logical, clear manner.

Questions often tend to be open-ended, so there will be no 'correct' answer. The interview is not in the first instance a test of your existing knowledge but of your power of reasoning and your ability to think critically and discuss issues.

Interviews usually last between 20 and 45 minutes.

Interviewers will be looking for evidence of general interest in and enthusiasm for your chosen subject and the motivation to work hard.

How will MPW mock interviews help you in the real thing?

It is worth saying what our mock interviews are not: they are not intended to enable you to prepare material for an interview. Our purpose is to give you an idea of what an actual interview is like. To that end, the interview experience should enable you to identify your strengths and weaknesses both in using your subject knowledge and in interview techniques. Since applicants are encouraged to read beyond the bounds of their subject specifications as part of their preparation, we will ask questions which explore your ability to think independently. Having an analytical and critical discussion over a wide range of issues with strangers in a setting at once formal and unfamiliar is effective preparation for the real thing.

How does the MPW interview process work?

Interviews are held by senior staff and external experts at MPW and last for up to 40 minutes, after which verbal feedback is given, as well as a written report. Both written and verbal feedback will assess you on your:

- passion for your chosen subject;
- subject knowledge;
- responsiveness to new material within a tutorial situation;
- ability to think analytically and creatively;
- · evidence of reading;
- knowledge of your chosen course and college; and
- · verbal and non-verbal communication skills.

In addition, the report will offer suggestions about how you might improve your chances of success, especially in relation to further reading and research.

All mock interview candidates are given a copy of the MPW Guide *Getting into Oxford and Cambridge*. This provides detailed, up-to-date advice and information about all aspects of Oxford and Cambridge admissions.

You may wish to book a second interview in order to have the opportunity of acting on the recommendations of a previous report and to become familiar with different interview styles.

MPW Personal Statement Review

What constitutes a great personal statement as far as an Admission Tutor is concerned?

Most candidates will present themselves with excellent grades, predicted or actual, and glowing references from their teachers. They may also have taken specific admission tests or submitted written work. The personal statement is one more element which can be used to judge whether or not a candidate will be suitable for their courses.

Be assured they are not expecting a literary masterpiece or a work of stunning originality. They want to hear about you, and in particular:


- What interests you about your chosen subject and why?
- Why you want to study the subject(s) you've applied for?
- What you have learnt/done outside your school/ college?

- What have you done/studied that has added to your
- knowledge of your subject?
- What do you do apart from studying and why is this important to you?
- What do you hope to do after you've finished university, if you have any idea?

Over the years, we have often been asked to give an opinion on the quality of a student's personal statement. When you've finished your first draft, we can provide you with feedback on its strengths and weaknesses. We often list additional reading/research areas that would make the personal statement more compelling and we can give you guidance on how it might be improved. What we won't do is write it for you.

Individual Tuition for Oxford and Cambridge Tests

Over the past few years, more and more students have been achieving A and A* grades at A level. As it has become harder to identify academically outstanding students through their A level results, both Oxford and Cambridge now rely on additional testing systems when selecting candidates for interview.

A full list of these tests and the dates on which they are sat appears on the last page of this prospectus. The tests aim to highlight the natural intelligence and academic potential of the candidate and, in doing so, widen access to the universities. It is therefore difficult to prepare for the tests; students have to rely on their innate intellectual ability to complete them. In theory, no student, whatever their school, should be at a disadvantage.

The style of testing also differs from what many school leavers will be used to. Whereas A levels often test factual recall, the Oxbridge written exams look for analytical and critical capabilities. There is no pass mark for these tests and you will certainly not be expected to achieve 100%. Furthermore, your score will not be the deciding factor but one criterion amongst many determining whether you are called for interview or offered a place.

Testing happens at various stages during the application process. Tests for Oxford courses and some Cambridge courses are sat in early November at your school. The results of these tests can then play a part in determining whether you are called to interview. Other Cambridge courses will ask you to sit a test if you are called for interview in early December.

Don't let taking these tests put you off applying. If you are serious about wanting a place at a top university, you should be able to do well without masses of additional tuition or extra work. It is very important, however, to go online and get full details of what the tests entail and to do some practice papers if they are provided.

Early September 2021

Candidates must check to see if there is a written test for their subject and ensure that they have registered, where required. Please see the following page for a summary of courses and tests.

1 October 2021

Applicants are responsible for ensuring they register for the BMAT (November sitting) by this date, if they want to avoid the late registration fee.

15 October 2021

The closing date for all Cambridge applications, for registration for pre-interview written assessments and for late registration for the BMAT (November sitting).

22 October 2021

The closing date for the submission of the Supplementary Application Questionnaire (SAQ).

3 November 2021

Some pre-interview admissions assessments (ECAA, ENGAA, NSAA) and the November sitting of the BMAT.

4 November 2021

Remaining pre-interview admissions assessments (TSA, TMUA, ELAT).

Early November 2021

Closing dates for the submission of written work should fall in this week (if requested). Please check with your college to find out the exact date.

December 2021

Interviews will usually take place in the first three weeks of December. All interviews will be conducted online in 2021. All at-interview written assessments will take place during this time as well.


